COMMUNITY REPORT 2020-2021





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DEAR FRIENDS AND SUPPORTERS

For the past half century, Mile High Early Learning (MHEL) has been sustained by our friends and partners. This year, as we begin celebrating our 50th anniversary, we are especially grateful for the steadfast support of our community. Following are a few mission-critical achievements from the 2020-2021 academic year.

- Race and equity continue to be integral within our organization. The importance of early care and education in challenging and breaking through systemic inequities is critical. Three-month-old babies can visually categorize faces by race. Toddlers begin to connect racial features to a person's behavior. Preschoolers can identify and act out against racial injustice on their own. MHEL has partnered with Resilient Futures to provide training and support on trauma-informed care and culturally responsive practices with an equity lens. Children's experiences in their formative years have the power to change our world.
- The COVID-19 pandemic challenged early childhood education to reimagine itself.
 With child care centers limited in capacity to serve children because of stricter regulations and an uncertain future, we needed to create a new way to reach our children.
 MHEL developed a remote learning framework for children 6 months to 5 years that incorporates educational experiences that young children have in classrooms into a virtual learning environment. MHEL piloted two remote learning classes and launched an ongoing process to enhance the curriculum in collaboration with our partners and our families.
 As a result of this work, teachers, children, and families are "remote ready"—which means families have the materials and equipment they need for remote learning, and teachers have lesson plans for children of all ages.
- MHEL received two new grants from the Office of Head Start to expand its successful
 Early Head Start and Head Start programs. These grants will allow us to serve more young
 children through new and expanded partnerships with other early childhood providers
 operating in child care deserts.

Thank you for being a partner in our commitment to helping children and families thrive.

PROGRAM PROFILE 2020-2021 CHILDREN AND FAMILIES SERVED

31% of children in Denver eligible for Head Start/Early Head Start were served

100% – average monthly enrollment of Head Start/Early Head Start children

532 infants, toddlers, and preschoolers in our early learning centers

91% of families were living at or below the federal poverty level (\$26,500 for a family of four), and 48 families experienced homelessness.

68% of the families were one-parent households.

85% of children's parents/guardians were working or attending school.

25% of MHEL families are immigrants or refugees. Families come from **18** different countries and speak over **30** different languages; **38**% speak a primary language other than English.

Babies Ready for College

688 Family, Friend and Neighbor caregivers, parents and children participated in Babies Ready for College, Babies Ready for College: Next Steps, Play & Learn Groups, and/or Short & Sweet Book Clubs.

PROGRAM ACCOMPLISHMENTS 2020-2021

Child Outcomes

- 93% of children met or exceeded the widely held expectations for cognitive development as measured by Teaching Strategies GOLD (TSG), the assessment system for children 6 weeks to 5 years used to measure children's readiness for school. 91% of children met or exceeded expectations for literacy; 90% met or exceeded expectations for physical development; and 85% met or exceeded expectations for social-emotional development.
- 100% of children demonstrated growth and made steady improvement.
- 100% of children received early intervention screenings; 49 children were identified as having special needs and received services through an Individualized Education Plan or Individualized Family Service Plan.
- **100**% of children had a medical home and health insurance and were current on immunizations and physicals.
- **90**% of children had continuous, accessible dental care; 82% received preventive care.

Family Outcomes

- 96% of families found the program helpful to their children and like the Montessori Inspired approach
- **92**% know how to be involved in and support their child's education
- 58% of families participated in parenting education programs
- 35% of parents received health education

Workforce Development

Staff education achievements:

- 24 teachers with MA degrees
- **38** teachers with BA/BS degrees
- 8 teachers with AA degrees
- 34 teachers have earned the Child Development Associate credential
- 38 educators have earned the Inclusive Practices in Early Childhood credential
- Mile High Early Learning provided development opportunities to more than 300 early learning professionals at Mile High Early Learning and community programs through its nationally recognized Professional Learning Center.

Our teachers continue to receive:

- 90+ professional development hours including two weeklong Professional Development Institutes
- **30**+ hours of intensive coaching
- Financial support to pursue early childhood degrees

Program Outcomes


- All early learning centers are rated a Level 4 on Colorado Shines, the Quality Rating and Improvement System.
- MHEL uses the Classroom Assessment Scoring System to measure the quality of teacher interactions with children which showed growth in all domains: Emotional Support, Classroom Organization, and Instructional Support.
- Mile High Early Learning completed the full cycle of monitoring events under the Office of Head Start's aligned monitoring system for the current project period for Head Start and Early Head Start. The program was found to have no deficiencies, and at the time of the final review, all areas were compliant.


FINANCIAL PROFILE: FY 2020-2021
